# Report by the Trustee on the Administration of the Environment and Conservation Fund

This report covers the financial year ending 31 March 1997.

#### Environment and Conservation Fund (ECF)

- 2. In the 1993 Policy Address to the Legislative Council, the Governor proposed to set up the ECF for funding education and research in relation to environmental and conservation matters.
- 3. The Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance (the Ordinance), which established the ECF, was enacted in June 1994. An initial capital injection of \$50 million was subsequently approved by the Finance Committee. The ECF came into operation in August 1994.

#### Trustee

4. Section 5 of the Ordinance provides for the Secretary for Planning, Environment and Lands to act as the trustee of the ECF.

#### ECF Committee and vetting of applications

- 5. The ECF Committee, established in accordance with section 7 of the Ordinance, is to advise the trustee on the use of the ECF for the purposes of funding educational, research and other projects and activities in relation to environmental and conservation matters. The Committee consists of a chairman, not more than eight non-official members appointed by the Governor for a term of two years and four ex-officio members. The membership list is on page 4.
- 6. The ECF Committee has established a vetting sub-committee to consider environmental research and other projects. The sub-committee comprises ECF Committee members and co-opted members from various sectors of the community. The membership list of the ECF Vetting Sub-committee is on page 5.
- 7. The ECF Committee has entrusted the vetting of educational projects to the Environmental Campaign Committee (ECC). The reason for this arrangement is that the ECC has developed the expertise and administrative framework for considering such projects. The membership list of the ECC is on page 6.
- 8. Both the ECF Vetting Sub-committee and ECC can approve grants up to \$120,000 for a project. For applications exceeding this limit, the recommendations of the relevant vetting bodies have to be endorsed by the ECF Committee.
- 9. Secretariat services to the ECF Committee and ECF Vetting Sub-committee are provided by the Planning, Environment and Lands Bureau (PELB), whereas the secretariat services to the ECC are provided by the Environmental Protection Department (EPD).

10. Applications can be submitted any time using the prescribed application forms which are available in all district offices, the EPD and the PELB. Vetting is done every two months at the Sub-committee and ECC level. The ECF Committee meets half yearly to consider the recommendations of the Sub-committee and ECC.

#### Criteria for vetting applications

- 11. Only applications from non-profit-making bodies and community groups will be considered for funding support. The following broad criteria are used in assessing the merits of individual applications:
  - (1) Projects selected for funding support will be expected to contribute to the overall environment of Hong Kong, to raise environmental awareness of the local community, or to mobilise the community to take action to improve the environment.
  - (2) The benefits must accrue to the local community as a whole, and not just an individual, a single private organisation or a consortium of private companies.
  - (3) Projects should be non-profit making in nature. Income derived from a project should be used to further the project's aims.
  - (4) In considering a project proposal, due consideration will be given to:-
    - (a) the benefits that it will bring to Hong Kong's environment, ecology, flora and fauna etc., or the extent to which it will enhance the environmental awareness of the local community;
    - (b) whether there is a demonstrable need for the proposed project:
    - (c) the technical and project management capability of the applicant;
    - (d) whether the proposed project's schedule of implementation is well-planned and the duration reasonable;
    - (e) whether the proposed budget is reasonable and realistic;
    - (f) whether the proposed project has alternative sources of funding support;
    - (g) whether the proposed project should more appropriately be funded by other sources;
    - (h) whether there is or likely to be a duplication of the work already or currently carried out by other groups; and

- (i) if recurrent expenditure is incurred, whether the proposed project has potential to become self-sufficient after a certain period of time.
- 12. To improve the operational efficiency of the ECF, the application approval procedure has been streamlined and more frequent meetings or circulation of applications for endorsement could be arranged as necessary. To enhance the transparency of the ECF operation, the minutes of meetings are made available to the public. A review is being conducted with a view to further improving its operation.

#### Approved applications

13. From 1 April 1996 to 31 March 1997, a total of 117 applications for funding support were considered and their vetting results are as follows:

# Environment and Conservation Fund Notes on the Accounts

#### 1. General

The Environment and Conservation Fund accounts are prepared in accordance with section 8(1) of the Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance, Cap. 450. The Fund was established for the purposes of funding educational, research and other projects and activities in relation to environmental and conservation matters in accordance with section 4 of the Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance, Cap. 450.

## 2. Accounting policy

The accounts are kept on an accrual basis.


#### 3. Grants

Grants to the Environmental Campaign Committee for funding its core activities and projects undertaken by other non-profit making organizations are treated as payments in the Environment and Conservation Fund accounts. ## 4. Contingent liabilities

There is a contingent liability of \$3,175,793 as at 31 March 1997, being the outstanding balance of approved grants payable to organizations subject to satisfactory progress or completion of the relevant projects.



Respective responsibilities of the Secretary for

Planning, Environment and Lands and the Director of Audit

Under the provisions of section 8(1) of the Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance (Cap. 450), the Secretary for Planning, Environment and Lands is responsible for the preparation of financial statements. In preparing the financial statements, the Secretary for Planning, Environment and Lands has to select appropriate accounting policies and to apply them consistently.

It is my responsibility to form an independent opinion, based on my audit, on those statements and to report my opinion to you.

# Basis of opinion

I certify that I have audited the financial statements referred to above in accordance with the provisions of section 8(2) of the Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance and the Audit Commission auditing standards. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgments made by the Secretary for Planning, Environment and Lands in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the circumstances of the Environment and Conservation Fund, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

I planned and performed my audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which I considered necessary in order to provide me with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. In forming my opinion I also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements. I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

## Opinion

In my opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view, in all material respects, of the state of affairs of the Environment and Conservation Fund as at 31 March 1997 and of its deficit for the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the provisions of section 8(1) of the Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance.
