# Report by the Trustee on the Administration of the Environment and Conservation Fund

This report covers the financial year ending 31 March 2001.

# Environment and Conservation Fund (ECF)

 $\cdot^{t}$ 

- 2. In the 1993 Policy Address to the Legislative Council, the then Governor proposed to set up the ECF for funding education and research in relation to environmental and conservation matters.
- 3. The Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance (the Ordinance), which established the ECF, was enacted in June 1994. An initial capital injection of \$50 million was subsequently approved by the Finance Committee. The ECF came into operation in August 1994. In 1998, Finance Committee further approved another \$50 million for the Fund.

### Trustee

4. Section 5 of the Ordinance provides for the Secretary for the Environment and Food to act as the trustee of the ECF.

# ECF Committee and vetting of applications

- 5. The ECF Committee, established in accordance with section 7 of the Ordinance, is to advise the trustee on the use of the ECF for the purposes of funding educational, research and other projects and activities in relation to environmental and conservation matters. The Committee consists of a chairman, not more than eight non-official members appointed by the Chief Executive for a term of two years and four ex-officio members. The membership list is on page 6.
- 6. The ECF Committee has established a vetting sub-committee to consider environmental research and other projects. The sub-committee comprises ECF Committee members and co-opted members from various sectors of the community. The membership list of the ECF Vetting Sub-committee is on page 7.

- 7. The ECF Committee has entrusted the vetting of educational projects to the Environmental Campaign Committee (ECC). The reason for this arrangement is that the ECC has developed the expertise and administrative framework for considering such projects. The membership list of the ECC is on pages 8-9.
- 8. Both the ECF Vetting Sub-committee and ECC can approve grants up to \$150,000 for a project. For applications exceeding this limit, the recommendations of the relevant vetting bodies have to be endorsed by the ECF Committee.
- 9. The Environment and Food Bureau (EFB) provides secretariat service to the ECF Committee and ECF Vetting Sub-committee, whereas the Environmental Protection Department (EPD) provides the secretariat service to the ECC.
- 10. Applications can be submitted any time using the prescribed application forms, which are available in all district offices, the EFB, the EPD, the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department, the Wheelock and Company Limited and Environmental Resource Centres. Vetting is usually done every two months at the Sub-committee and ECC level. The ECF Committee normally meets half yearly to consider the recommendations of the Sub-committee and ECC, although it will meet more frequently if necessary.

## Criteria for vetting applications

4

- 11. Applications from non-profit making organisations and community groups will be considered for funding support. Local incorporated comparies may apply funding for technology demonstration projects. The following broad criteria are used in assessing the merits of individual applications:
  - (1) Projects selected for funding support will be expected to contribute to the overall environment of Hong Kong, to raise environmental awareness of the local community, or to mobilise the community to take action to improve the environment.
  - (2) The benefits must accrue to the local community as a whole, and not just an individual, a single private organisation or a consortium of private companies.
  - (3) Projects should be non-profit making in nature. Income derived from a project should be used to further the project's aims.

- (4) In considering a project proposal, due consideration will be given to:-
  - (a) the benefits that it will bring to Hong Kong's environment, ecology, flora and fauna etc., or the extent to which it will enhance the environmental awareness of local community;
  - (b) whether there is a demonstrable need for the proposed project;
  - (c) the technical and project management capability of the applicant;
  - (d) whether the proposed project's schedule of implementation is well-planned and the duration is reasonable;
  - (e) whether the proposed budget is reasonable and realistic;
  - (f) whether the proposed project has alternative sources of funding support;
  - (g) whether the proposed project should more appropriately be funded by other sources;
  - (h) whether there is or likely to be a duplication of the work already or currently carried out by other groups; and
  - (i) if recurrent expenditure is incurred, whether the proposed project has potential to become self-sufficient after a certain period of time.
- 12. An ECF Homepage has been set up on the Internet to allow applicants to download application forms and other information, e.g. a list of projects approved under ECF.

# Approved applications

13. From 1 April 2000 to 31 March 2001, a total of 179 applications for funding support were considered. Their vetting results are as follows:

(a) applications approved	88
(b) applications approved in principle	3
(c) applications being processed	55
(d) applications rejected	28
(e) applications withdrawn by applicants	5

- 14. Of the 88 approved applications, 86 were funded by the ECF with a total committed grant of about \$22.24 million, whereas 2 were jointly funded by the ECF and the Woo Wheelock Green Fund with a grant of about \$1.4 million.

# REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF AUDIT TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

I have audited the attached financial statements which have been prepared under the accounting policies set out in note 2 to the accounts.

# Respective responsibilities of the Secretary for the Environment and Food and the Director of Audit

It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the Secretary for the Environment and Food in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the circumstances of the Environment and Conservation Fund, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

I planned and performed my audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which I considered necessary in order to provide me with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. In forming my opinion I also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements. I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

# Environment and Conservation Fund Notes on the Accounts

### General

The Environment and Conservation Fund accounts are prepared in accordance with section 8(1) of the Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance (Cap. 450). The Fund was established for the purposes of funding educational, research and other projects and activities in relation to environmental and conservation matters in accordance with section 4 of the Environment and Conservation Fund Ordinance

# 2. Accounting policies

(a) Basis for preparation of accounts

The accounts are kept on an accausal basis.

- (b) Revenue recognition
  - (i) Contribution from the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region is recognised on actual receipt.
  - (ii) Interest income from bank deposits is recognised on a time apportioned basis based on the principal amounts outstanding at the applicable interest rates.

### 3. Grants

Grants to the Environmental Campaign Committee for funding its core activities and projects undertaken by other non-profit making organisations are treated as payments in the Environment and Conservation Fund accounts. As at 31 March 2001, an unspent balance of \$235,240 was held by the Environmental Campaign Committee:

### 4. Contingent liabilities

There is a contingent liability of \$16,479,484 as at 31 March 2001, being the outstanding balance of approved grants payable to organisations subject to satisfactory progress or completion of the relevant projects.

There is a maximum payment of \$750,000 being amount of grants to Tsuen Wan Environmental Resources. Centre approved in 2000-01 but not yet due for payment.
